Wednesday, May 02, 2007 11:13 AM: Technical Issues, and the Future of SharePoint

As we move forward into the summer, SharePoint has proven to be one of the most pivotal and successful technology initiatives in Fayette County! With over 900 SharePoint sites, 4,000 registered users (and hundreds of thousands of others with access), and over 500 gigabytes of stored data, this space is quickly becoming a pivotal part of many educator's working day.

As you prepare to wrap up the semester, a few technical "heads-up" issues to which you should pay attention:

- **Dead Sites:** If you have a SharePoint space that's not being used, move what you need and delete it (or have it deleted). Over the next few weeks, I will be contacting folks as I find sites that haven't been updated for over 6 months.
- **Scheduled Upgrade.** SharePoint still has not received its scheduled upgrade. Since the sheer size of SharePoint has nearly outgrown our ability to provide backup, we're waiting for new software before doing the upgrade. Look for an announcement in June.
- **Office 2007 issues.** Many folks who have already upgraded to Office2007 have discovered that it doesn't always work well with our current version of SharePoint. If you attempt to open a doc and Internet Explorer "...has to close..." (crashes), you're a victim! You can always right-click, "Save target as...", and work on a doc on your own computer just fine. Contact your STC or the TRT office if you need help.
- **Template development:** New template development for classroom support has temporarily been suspended until the fall. Look for hybrid classes and full courseware support in August!
